



Kayak Adventure & Shamanic Encounter

Day 1

We begin our journey with an 8:00 AM departure from Quito, embarking on a scenic 3.5-hour drive through the Andes to the edge of the Amazon basin. Upon arrival at the Arajuno River, we'll enjoy a welcome picnic and a detailed safety briefing about the kayaking activity and equipment use. The Arajuno River is calm and classified as Class I, making it perfect for beginners. No prior kayaking experience is needed—our expert guides will provide instruction to ensure a smooth and enjoyable paddle. As we glide along the river, you'll witness the breathtaking biodiversity of the Amazon rainforest and spot some of the many bird species that inhabit the shoreline.

After approximately two hours of paddling, we'll arrive at our riverside glamping site, nestled in a serene and tranquil setting. Enjoy a refreshing drink upon check-in and unwind before a delicious traditional dinner is served.

In the evening, a local shaman will visit our camp to share insights into the spiritual practices and medicinal traditions of the jungle—an unforgettable cultural experience.

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Parrot Clay Lick, Jungle Trek, & Kichwa Community Visit

Day 2

We start the day early with a short 10-minute canoe ride to visit a parrot clay lick, where vibrant Amazon parrots gather each morning to consume mineral-rich clay, an essential ritual that helps them detoxify their diet.

After returning to camp for breakfast, we prepare for a 2–3 hour educational jungle trek (length adjusted to the group's pace). Along the trail, your guide will introduce you to the diverse flora and fauna of the Amazon and explain the delicate balance of this unique ecosystem.

In the afternoon, we visit a nearby Kichwa community for an immersive cultural experience. Enjoy a traditional meal, visit the local school supported by our program, and if time allows join a friendly soccer game with the children. You'll also have the opportunity to purchase beautiful, handmade crafts from local women artisans, supporting their sustainable livelihood.

Back at the campsite, unwind with a refreshing swim in the river or gather around the bonfire. For those who are interested, there's an optional night hike to discover the fascinating nocturnal life of the rainforest, including insects and amphibians.



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Final Kayak & Amazon Lagoon Exploration

Day 3

After breakfast, we set out for a final kayaking adventure, paddling down the Arajuno River for approximately two hours. From there, a short 15-minute drive will take us to a nearby private reserve and lagoon, where we'll explore by canoe in search of monkeys, colorful birds, and other wildlife unique to this area.

After a final lunch, we begin our journey back to Quito, arriving in the city around 6:00 PM.



Packing list

Essential Documents & Money

- Passport & ID (or copies)
- Travel insurance information
- Cash (small denominations for crafts, tips, etc. USD is the currency in Ecuador)
- Credit/Debit Cards

Clothing (Quick-Drying & Lightweight are Key)

- Long-sleeved shirts (2-3): Lightweight, breathable, quick-drying for sun protection, insect bites, and warmth in the evenings. Light colors are best.
- Long pants (1-2): Lightweight, quick-drying, convertible pants are excellent. Protects from sun, insects, and scratches on trails. No jeans (they stay wet and heavy).
- Shorts (1-2 pairs): For around camp or if you prefer them for kayaking (though long pants are recommended for protection).
- Swimsuit (1): For river swims.
- Rain jacket/Poncho: Lightweight, breathable, and waterproof. Essential for sudden downpours.
- Light sweater or fleece: For cooler evenings or early mornings.
- Underwear (2-3 pairs): Quick-drying materials.
- Socks (2-3 pairs): Moisture-wicking, synthetic or wool socks are best. Avoid cotton for hiking.

Footwear

- Closed-toe water shoes/sandals with straps (e.g., Chacos, Tevas, Keens):
 Ideal for kayaking, river swims, and around camp. They can get wet and dry quickly.
- Comfortable hiking shoes/boots: Lightweight, broken-in, and ideally waterproof or water-resistant.
- Flip-flops or comfortable sandals: For relaxing at the glamping site.



Gear & Accessories

- Daypack (small, 20-30L): For daily excursions, carrying water, camera, snacks, etc.
- Water bottle (reusable): Crucial for staying hydrated.
- Dry bag (10-20L): Essential for protecting electronics, extra clothes, and documents during kayaking. Even if supplied, having your own is good.
- Headlamp or small flashlight with extra batteries: For night hikes and around camp.
- Sunscreen (high SPF): Even on cloudy days, UV index is high near the equator.
- Insect repellent (DEET recommended): Crucial for mosquito and other insect protection.
- Sun hat or baseball cap: For sun protection.
- Sunglasses: With a strap if possible for kayaking.
- Small towel (quick-drying/microfiber): Handy for various uses.
- Plastic bags/Ziploc bags: For wet clothes, trash, organizing.

Health & Personal Care

- Personal toiletries: Biodegradable options are preferred for environmental reasons.
- Hand sanitizer:
- Personal medications: Enough for the entire trip, plus a few extra days.
- Basic First-Aid Kit:
 - o Pain relievers (ibuprofen, acetaminophen)
 - Antihistamines (for allergies or insect bites)
 - o Band-aids, antiseptic wipes, gauze
 - Anti-diarrhea medication
 - Hydrocortisone cream (for bites/rashes)
 - Moleskin or blister treatment
- Anti-itch cream: For insect bites.
- Small mirror (optional)



Optional but Recommended

- Camera with extra batteries/memory card: Waterproof camera or protection for your regular camera is highly recommended for kayaking.
- Binoculars: Excellent for wildlife viewing (birds, monkeys).
- Book/E-reader: For downtime.
- Journal and pen: To record your experiences.
- Small, lightweight backpacker's towel: If you prefer your own or for quick drying after swims.
- Power bank/portable charger: For electronics.
- Small amount of laundry detergent/soap: For handwashing small items if needed.
- Earplugs: If you are a light sleeper (for jungle sounds or shared spaces).
- Eye mask: For sleeping.

Important Considerations

- Pack light! You'll be moving between locations, and while glamping offers comfort, excess luggage can be cumbersome.
- Waterproof everything important: The Amazon is wet. Assume anything not in a dry bag will get damp or wet.
- Leave valuables at home or secured: Only bring what you absolutely need.
- Inform your guides: If you have any medical conditions or allergies.

- Visas and Passports: Make sure you check your visa and passport validity

- **Transportation:** Driving time can take more than expected in Ecuador, as it is a small country with roads meandering through the Andes Mountains.

- Level of Activity: This trip is rated a 2 out of 5 for activity level, making it accessible to most. No prior experience is necessary! Your guides will provide thorough briefings on safety and gear usage before each part of the journey. The Arajuno River is predominantly calm with flat water, featuring only a few small, fun, and easy-to-navigate rapids. Hiking involves irregular terrain, but we offer flexible distances so you can choose between shorter or longer routes based on your preference.



Important Information

• Weather: The Ecuadorian Amazon experiences a consistently warm and humid climate year-round, lacking traditional four seasons due to its equatorial location. Instead, it has a rainy season (roughly March to July, with peak rain in May-June) and a drier season (typically December to February). Temperatures average around 25°C (77°F) with high humidity (80%-95%). During the drier season, daytime temperatures can be hotter, while the rainy season sees frequent, heavy afternoon downpours. Rainy Season brings higher river levels, facilitating deeper canoe exploration, and the rainforest is at its most lush. Trails can be muddier. Drier Season means lower river levels (sometimes affecting canoe access in very shallow areas) and less muddy hiking trails, with potentially fewer mosquitoes. Ultimately, there's no "bad" time to visit; the best time depends on activity preference (river travel vs. hiking) and tolerance for rain or intense heat. Visitors should always be prepared for warmth, humidity, and insects. The Ecuadorian Amazon has a consistently warm and humid tropical climate year-round, averaging around 25°C (77°F) with high humidity (80%-95%). Instead of distinct seasons, it has a rainy season (roughly March to July, with May-June often wettest) and a drier season (typically December to February, though some extend it from August to March). During the rainy season, expect frequent, heavy afternoon showers. This leads to higher river levels, making canoe travel deeper into the forest easier and supporting lush vegetation and increased wildlife activity. Drier periods see less rain but still significant precipitation, with hotter daytime temperatures. River levels drop, potentially making some canoe routes harder but improving hiking trail conditions. Overall, rain is a constant presence, vital for the rainforest's biodiversity, and visitors should always be prepared for it, regardless of the time of year. Both periods offer unique advantages for wildlife viewing and exploration.

Important Information

- Sustainability: We do our best to not produce any trash; we believe that recycling is not enough, so we try to avoid using any plastic or materials that pollute our environment. Every day we work towards being a zerowaste tour operator and our staff is well trained to leave the least impact possible in our service areas. We also work with local indigenous communities in the different regions. By doing so we are able to teach our guests about the rich culture Ecuador, all the while helping the people preserve their traditions and lands. By working directly with local peoples, we are able to create a sustainable touristic income for the community.
